Mary Eberstadt is a research fellow at the Hoover Institution and consulting editor to *Policy Review*. Eberstadt focuses on issues on American society, culture, and philosophy. She has written widely for various magazines and newspapers, including *Policy Review*, *The Weekly Standard*, *First Things*, *The American Spectator*, *Los Angeles Times*, *London Times*, *Newark Star-Ledger*, and *The Wall Street Journal*. Her newest book is *The Loser Letters: A Comic Tale of Life, Death, and Atheism*, which will be published in spring 2010. She is also author of *Home-Along America: The Hidden Toll of Day Care, Behavioral Drugs and Other Parent Substitutes* and editor of *Why I Turned Right: Leading Baby Boom Conservatives Chronicle Their Political Journeys*. Between 1998 and 1990, she was executive editor of the *National Interest* magazine. From 1985 to 1987, she was a member of the Policy Planning Staff of the U.S. State Department, a speechwriter for Secretary of State George P. Shultz, and a special assistant to Ambassador Jeane J. Kirkpatrick at the U.S. Mission to the United Nations. She was also managing editor at the *Public Interest*. A four-year Telluride Scholar at Cornell University, Eberstadt graduated magna cum laude.

Mary Anne Layden, PhD, is a psychotherapist and Director of Education at the Center for Cognitive Therapy at the University of Pennsylvania. She is the Director of the Sexual Trauma and Psychopathology Program. She specializes in the treatment of victims and perpetrators of sexual violence, sexual addicts and sex industry members. She has co-authored a chapter with Linnea Smith called "Adult Survivors of the Child Sexual Exploitation Industry" in Giardino, A, et al (Eds) *Medical, Legal, & Social Science Aspects of Child Sexual Exploitation: A Comprehensive Review of Pornography, Prostitution, and Internet Crimes*. She has testified before the U. S. Congress on five occasions focused on issues of sexual violence, the sexual exploitation industry and the media. She has lectured extensively both in the US and abroad on Cognitive Therapy, childhood sexual trauma, sexual addiction, sexual exploitation industry and imagery techniques.

Emmett McGroarty, Esq., is the Director of the Preserve Innocence, an initiative of the American Principles Project. The mission of Preserve Innocence is to promote policies and actions that protect children. Mr. McGroarty's previous experience includes working for a nonprofit dedicated to combating human exploitation and serving in the anti-trafficking in persons program at the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services. Mr. McGroarty is a graduate of Fordham School of Law and Georgetown University.

James R. Stoner, Jr. is Professor in political science at Louisiana State University where he teaches political theory, English common law, and American constitutionalism. In 2002-03 he was a Visiting Fellow in the James Madison Program in American Ideals and Institutions at Princeton University, and he served from 2002 to 2006 on the National Council on the Humanities. Dr. Stoner will edit a new journal *American Political Thought*, scheduled to launch in 2010. In addition to researching American political thought and political development, he continues work on a book tentatively titled "*Resisting Judicial Supremacy*," with Richard Morgan (Bowdoin College), and on a study of the political and constitutional thought of St. Thomas More. He received his Ph.D. from Harvard University.

W. Bradford Wilcox is Associate Professor of Sociology at the University of Virginia and director of the National Marriage Project. His research focuses on the influence of religious belief and practice on marriage, cohabitation, parenting, and fatherhood. His book *Soft Patriarchs, New Men: How Christianity Shapes Fathers and Husbands* examines the ways in which the religious beliefs and practices of American Protestant men influence their approach to parenting, household labor, and marriage. Currently, Dr. Wilcox is researching the effect that religion has on relationships among low income parents in urban America. His work has been featured in *The Washington Post*, *USA Today*, *The Boston Globe*, *The Los Angeles Times*, *CBS News*, and numerous NPR stations. He received his Ph.D. from Princeton University before returning to the University of Virginia, where he had earned his undergraduate degree.
